Gynecologic Oncology Managing Medications After Surgery (No NSAIDs)



Restart your home medications as instructed by your doctor. While most home medications can be restarted after surgery, certain medications should be held for a few days. Your doctor will discuss with you if you need to wait to restart any medications.

Pain Medication After Surgery

These medications should be taken on a regular schedule to prevent pain:

Acetaminophen (Tylenol) 1,000 mg by mouth every 8 hours. You can take 2 tablets of over the counter (OTC) Tylenol (500 mg tabs), or your doctor may prescribe these.

Some patients also need an additional scheduled medication to prevent pain:

Tramadol 50 mg by mouth every 6 hours. Most patients take Tramadol for 2-5 days after surgery,
 then wean down to only Tylenol.

The following medication should be taken as needed when your paitn level is 6 or above, and the above medications aren't controlling your pain:

Oxycodone 5 mg by mouth every 4 hours AS NEEDED for post-operative pain. Most patients take
oxycodone for 1-3 days after surgery, but some people need it for a little longer. You may or may not
require oxycodone at home, depending on how long you stay in the hospital.

If these medications are not controlling your pain, or if your pain is acutely worsening, call your doctor right away.
